## *The Pastor's Message*

I can't believe that summer is almost upon us! Now that I have finished my Assumption College courses, final exams, and submitted the students' grades, I have a whole bunch of free time at my disposal. In addition to having every Tuesday and Thursday free, I don't have to grade anywhere from 30 – 90 papers or exams every weekend. This leaves me time to do the long overdue fall cleanup of oak leaves from around the shrubs. It also leaves me time to walk the dog. I recently saw a poster in the vet's office that said, "If your dog is overweight, you aren't getting enough exercise."

As some of you have noted, my schedule during the school year is somewhat crazy, especially for someone who is not a spring chicken. Between teaching 3 courses each semester, my counseling practice, and my church responsibilities I commonly work 80 hours a week, 90 on weeks when I have extra church commitments or an exceptionally large number of papers to grade. This is why summer feels like a sabbatical to me. It gives me time to read, time that I don't have during the year. It also gives me time to spend with my wife and take the two annual thousand-mile drives to visit our children and grandchildren.

The other day, when I was admiring the sign in front of our church (that is kept current thanks to both the manual labor and the relentless prodding for sermon titles of Scott McKeen), I thought about what this sign communicates to the community. It is a way of letting passersby know that something is happening at this little church. We have already had several people visit our church because something in the sign piqued their interest.

I contrast this with the sign outside a Unitarian Universalist church in our area. Beginning the first Sunday every June, the sign reads: “We are on sabbatical for the summer. See you in September.”

I don't think what this church sign is talking about is a sabbatical. I think it is more of a vacation. A sabbatical is supposed to be a time of refreshing, like the Sabbath day that is observed by the Creator in the Book of Genesis. When God tells Israel to “remember the Sabbath and keep it holy,” he is not telling them that everyone should take at least one day off a week from work, though this is important and healthy. He is not talking about taking a vacation every summer, though this, too, is important and healthy. He is telling us (indeed, *commanding* us) to set aside time and energy from our busy schedules every week and every year to nourish the spiritual dimension and center of our life.

In this church, we do not close down for the summer. We might take a vacation from work, but we do not take a vacation from God or from Sunday worship. Our summer worship attendance is only slightly lower than our regular weekly attendance, which is relatively rare for churches in our area. This indicates that we grasp the difference between a sabbatical and a vacation.

I like the arrangement we have with Pilgrim Church for summer coverage, where the Reverend Jonathan Wortmann of Pilgrim Church preaches at both churches for five weeks and I cover both churches for the other five. This arrangement enables both Jon and me to take a vacation at no pulpit supply expense to either church. It provides built-in coverage for both churches in case of funerals or other pastoral emergencies. It enables us to keep both churches open, so people can worship in a space where they feel comfortable. It also enables us to continue to be with each other at our coffee hour time of fellowship, which is an important part of our Sunday morning experience. Unfortunately, because I will not be here for half the Sundays and because there is so little time between the two services, we do not hold the Sunday morning Bible study that has become a weekly sabbatical experience for me and several of our members.

This summer our worship service will be held at our regular time: 11:00 AM. If you need to attend an earlier service because of plans for the day, Pilgrim Church will be holding their service at 9:30 AM. I do need to remind you, however, that they don't have a coffee hour like ours!

I hope you not only have a great vacation this summer, but a meaningful sabbatical. I hope you take the time to read something that is spiritually challenging or uplifting. In this vein, I would suggest Dan Brown's *Angels and Demons*, which just came out in film, or William P. Young's *The Shack*. I am thinking of doing a study group on both of these books this coming fall.

I also hope to see you at Sunday worship!

For June, we will collect “filled” Love Loaves to support the Heifer Project.

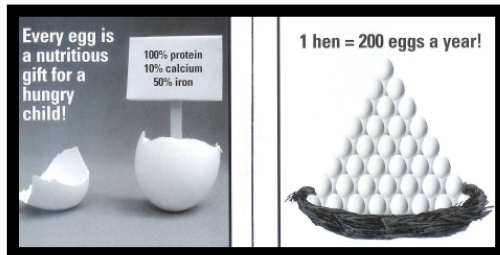
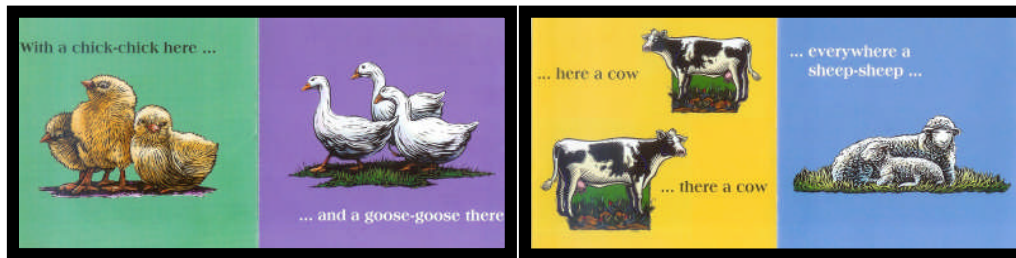

## *Missions Offering For July -- Haiti Mission*



Haiti remains the least-developed country in the Western Hemisphere and one of the poorest in the world. Nearly 80% of the population lives in abject poverty. Maternal and infant mortality rates are among the highest in the world, and malnutrition rates are very high. Illiteracy stands at 48%. For many Haitians, the road out of poverty leads to Miami or elsewhere in the developed world.

*“For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord...to give you a future and a hope.”  
(Jeremiah 29:11)*

In 1986 God impressed upon me this word from the prophet Jeremiah to take it back to the Haitian people on my second visit there in 1988. I did share this word with them then and still carry it in my heart today concerning Haiti. God’s eye is on the nation for good and though it seems slow in coming, I believe he has a plan for them, to raise them up and out of the poverty they have known for so long.

His Royal Ministry’s work in the south of Haiti is part of that plan to educate the children in our school there and to preach the Gospel in our two churches.

Our extended hand here at First Community Church in Southborough also enters into God’s plan for them, bringing hope and the blessing of our love and concern for them. My hope is that we will have joy in our hearts, knowing we are making a difference in Haiti.

In August, our Mission Offerings are donated to the Rape Crisis Center of Central Massachusetts. Since opening their doors in 1973, the mission of the Rape Crisis Center of Central Massachusetts (RCCCM) has been to provide quality and multicultural services to those whose lives have been impacted by sexual violence. They also provide education geared toward ending violence. RCCCM serves the geographic area of Central Massachusetts. Our offices are located in Worcester and Fitchburg. Counseling may also be available at outreach sites throughout Central Massachusetts.

At the RCCCM, we use the word "survivor" rather than "victim" to describe someone who has been raped or sexually assaulted in order to reflect one’s strength and healing capacity. Our agency services are based on a philosophy of empowerment. We recognize that sexual assault is

a violation motivated by power and control and is never the survivor's fault. RCCCM counselors help survivors regain a sense of control and power over their lives and find the right options for them.

Our spiral logo symbolizes the healing journey for survivors. The spiral's center represents the initial aftermath of sexual violence. The intersecting rays on the spiral symbolize the impact that sexual violence has on all aspects of our lives and our healing journey. As we travel this path and build resilience, strength, knowledge and awareness, the intersecting rays of impact diminish.

The Rape Crisis Center of Central Massachusetts is proudly one of the first rape crisis centers to be established in Massachusetts. Founded on the philosophy of empowerment and based on the leadership of survivors, the RCCCM has served as a leader within the movement to end sexual violence. The center is committed to the provision of comprehensive services to the communities within our service area, which now includes 47 cities and towns in the Greater Worcester and Fitchburg/Leominster areas. In addition to the services that we provide to our local community, we operate *Llámanos y Hablemos*, ("call us and let's talk") a statewide helpline and training program, serving the needs of Spanish speaking survivors of sexual assault.

Our Vision is:

- That each survivor has access to culturally appropriate services.
- That communities are actively engaged in prevention.
- That systems be well coordinated and survivor-centered.
- That survivors lead all aspects of the community response to sexual violence.

As a freestanding rape crisis center, the efforts of the entire agency are focused on the issues related to sexual violence. Our sole commitment to these issues results in a deep and widespread impact throughout Central Massachusetts.

## *A Blast From The Past*

### **125 Years Ago**

#### **1884 – August -- Southville**

- ◆ On Sunday night August 24, Elmer Jones' store in Southville was entered by thieves and a quantity of cigars and tobacco stolen. The thieves have the satisfaction of robbing a poor unfortunate cripple of the means of obtaining an honest living.

### **100 Years Ago**

#### **1909 – June -- Southville**

- ◆ The congregational Sunday school picnic was held Tuesday at Lincoln Park. They were in company with the S.S. of Southborough Center. A good time was had.

#### **1909 – July -- Southville**

- ◆ "Grandpa" Chickering having the honor of being the oldest person in town, was presented one day last week with a very handsome gold-headed cane from the Boston Post. He is 90 years young, and is erect and well preserved for one of his years. He is an earnest Christian worker, and Sunday usually finds him in his accustomed pew. Mr. Frank Dexter Newton of Fayville had the honor of making the presentation. (Editor's note: The Boston Post newspaper handed out these canes to most of the eastern Massachusetts towns to pass from oldest resident to oldest resident. Many have been lost but in a few towns, duplicates are used to continue this nice tradition).
- ◆ The Congregational people held their second Sunday school picnic at Lake Chauncy last Thursday, the day seeming to become one in which the cooling watermelon was the most fitting dessert, together with the many luscious cakes, pies, and sandwiches which kindly and generous hands supplied. The tables were spread on the broad veranda; plates were laid for some 70 participants. The tables were decorated with beautiful bouquets of sweet peas from the garden of Mrs. Samuel Clark. The mothers were in charge and when everything was ready, the "children were called in." Among the active ones seen were Mrs. Frank Chickering, Mrs. Cheney, Mrs. Clark, Mrs. Day, Mrs. Works and Mrs. Rogers. Many came by their own conveyances, some by trolley and some by steam cars. After dinner cheery groups were seen enjoying the beautiful shade, some riding over the "calm summer sea," while others patronized the moving picture entertainment. At the close of the day all decided the hours had been well and happily spent.

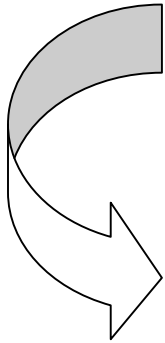

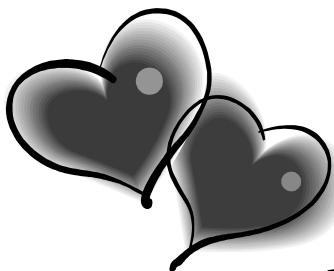

***“His Royal Ministry” -- Haiti Mission Church***
